


## From the Mayor



# RIDGELAND SELECTED AS MISSISSIPPI'S Healthiest Hometown

The City of Ridgeland has been selected as Mississippi's "Healthiest Hometown" in the fourth year of the Healthy Hometown program, presented by the Blue Cross & Blue Shield of Mississippi Foundation. The selection was based on the city's application, as judged by a panel of known health and wellness champions from around the country. Ridgeland will receive a \$50,000 grant from the Foundation to support ongoing community health initiatives.

Ridgeland's community-wide efforts are supported by partnerships among schools, churches, businesses, civic organizations and local government officials. The city is home to nearly 15 miles of recreational trails, more than any other city in the state. It hosts several high profile athletic events throughout the year, including the Heatwave Triathlon and the Natchez Trace Century Ride. Several local churches support health and fitness programs designed to encourage regular physical activity. The city also promotes health and wellness opportunities through its website and recognizes residents who are committed to healthy living.

The City of Brookhaven was selected as a Healthy Hometown for its population category (5,001 to 14,999 residents) and the City of Starkville was selected in its population category (50,000 or more residents). Each of these communities will receive a \$25,000 grant to continue their wellness efforts. The winning municipalities were announced Wednesday (July 17, 2013) at the Mississippi Municipal League Annual Conference in Biloxi.

"We are extremely proud of the progress Ridgeland has made in creating a healthy community for its residents," said Sheila Grogan, Executive Director of the Blue Cross & Blue Shield of Mississippi Foundation. "Their efforts will help ensure a higher quality of life for residents and will serve as a positive example for other municipalities around the state."

Judges for the 2013 Healthy Hometown program were Tara Costa, Season 7 finalist of NBC's "The Biggest Loser" and national health advocate; Oklahoma City Mayor Mick Cornett, who launched a citywide health initiative resulting in almost 50,000 citizens losing a combined 1,000,000 pounds; and Chris Waddell, the most decorated male skier in Paralympic history and the first paraplegic to summit Mount Kilimanjaro unassisted.

The Blue Cross & Blue Shield of Mississippi Foundation established the Healthy Hometown Awards in 2010 to

encourage communities to promote healthy lifestyles and to provide financial rewards to those who have demonstrated the most progress. The grants are used by the communities to further ongoing community wellness initiatives. Healthy Hometown winners are chosen based on select criteria, including having a tobacco-free ordinance, helmet laws and more.

## Recreational facilities

### **Freedom Ridge Park**

235 West School Street - Freedom Ridge Park, a 50-acre athletic facility, is located on School Street just behind the Ridgeland Police Department. The park features four lighted adult regulation softball fields, four lighted regulation soccer fields, four picnic pavilions two playgrounds including a universal playground for use by individuals with physical disabilities or limitations, two concession/restroom buildings, a lighted walking trail and a maintenance facility.

Each of the four pavilions at Freedom Ridge Park is available at an hourly rate of \$15 for residents, and \$25 for non-residents. The security deposit, our "clean-up insurance," is \$100.

### **Ridgeland Tennis Center**

201 McClellan Drive - The Ridgeland Tennis Center, a full-service public facility operated by tennis pros, is located at 201 McClellan Drive, off Highway 51. The center is home to 17 lighted, hard tennis courts, men's and women's locker rooms, a 2,000-square-foot covered porch for viewing, and a fully stocked tennis pro shop.

### **City Hall**

304 Highway 51 - Ridgeland City Hall is home to four soccer fields during the soccer season. During baseball season, this property converts to three T-ball fields.

### Ridgeland Recreational Center

137 Old Trace Park - The Ridgeland Recreational Center is housed in a two-story rustic lodge overlooking the Ross Barnett Reservoir. Daily activities for Superstar Seniors as well as nightly classes for all ages take place during the week in this facility.

### Friendship Park

475 Lake Harbour Drive - Friendship Park is a multi-purpose neighborhood park Facility. With a large lighted pavilion, a one-mile lighted walking/jogging trail, a fitness court, playground equipment, and restroom facilities, the park accommodates many and varying needs.

The pavilion is available for rental at an hourly rate of \$15 for residents, \$25 per hour for non-residents, with a security deposit of \$100. Park hours are 6:30 a.m. to 10 p.m.

#### **Wolcott Park**

349 McClellan Drive - Wolcott Park, a 40-acre athletic facility, is located on McClellan Drive, off Highway 51. It features seven lighted baseball/softball fields, a playground, 14 batting cages, two bull pens, two concession/restroom building and a maintenance facility.



# OTMS TECHNOLOGY STUDENT ASSOCIATION Recognized At National Conference

The Technology Student Association (TSA) (tsaweb.org) is a national competition circuit for middle and high schools, creating an opportunity for each school's best technology students to compete against one another. Olde Towne Middle's TSA group attended the 2013 National Conference in Orlando June 28-July 2, 2013 with hopes of having fun competing and proving their talents on a national level.

Olde Towne Middle School staff launched the first middle school chapter in the Madison County School system this year. Students worked their way through district and state competition to earn a place at the national competition in Orlando, taking five state champion teams and individuals to compete in Electronics, Structural Engineering, Tech Bowl (tech trivia), Techno Talk and Video Game Design.

Teacher sponsors Bill Richardson, Sheila McGraw, and Tammy King led the group, training up to the moment students entered the competition rooms. The greatest moment of the trip was when, in the conference room with more than five thousand other TSA competitors, Olde Towne's name was called as a national finalist! McKennley Wilson and Parker Goff were paired up with a team from Alabama to build a component in the Techno Talk division.

The TSA website describes this competition: "Participants (two teams of two members each per state) demonstrate the ability to work together in teams of randomly paired students in order to build and replicate a structure using limited communication." Each pair of students, which included one each from OTMS and Alabama could only communicate with the other team via text messages. One pair had the instructions while the other pair had the parts to build the component.

This event had 239 teams: McKennley and Parker placed as the ninth team in the nation, cheered on by the entire Mississippi delegation. Eighth-grade TSA students are now looking forward to competing at the high school level as they move on to Ridgeland High School. Mr. Richardson summarized their upcoming challenge, "All the events will be at an even higher level of complexity, but these students are the best of the best in our eyes."

Under Mr. Lawrence's leadership and with the help of capable, enthusiastic parents like Ms. Saddler, Olde Towne has seen a transformation to technology, student engagement and academic achievement," says superintendent Ronnie McGehee.

Lawrence ensures that all students are challenged in the classroom and engaged through a variety of extracurricular activities. He encourages students to explore individual interests and develop a sense of achievement.

Saddler, who has served as PTO president and vice president of fundraising, has helped Lawrence meet his goals over the last three years. She has been a driving force in the PTO's contribution to technology upgrades and in volunteer support of teacher and student activities.

One of Lawrence's priorities has been education in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM). Strong STEM programs, increased academic rigor and advanced classes for high-achieving students have produced positive results. Olde Towne Middle obtained the second highest scale score in the state on the 2012 Algebra I test. The Technology Student Association won eight district and six state titles in categories like construction engineering, electronics and video game design.

The Elite Science Team and the Radio and Technology Club continued the only middle school space program in the state. This year they successfully completed their third near-space balloon launch. Their balloons reach an average altitude of 75,000-95,000 feet, collecting data and photographs during the mission.

Superior performing arts programs at the school match the strong STEM program, providing a wonderful balanced curriculum. Students participating in band and choir have opportunities to improve their musical skills in the classroom, to perform in the community, and to compete at the local, state and national festivals.

Chamber Choir, a mixed ensemble of seventh- and eighthgrade students, won best in class at Riverland Music Festival in Pearl. During spring break at Festival Disney in Orlando, the choir garnered a golden Mickey for best overall middle school choir, all superior ratings and best in class middle school ensemble.


### "The Two Sides of Charles E. Smith"


