FROM THE MAYOR



I hope this message finds you in the spirit of bloom: azaleas and irises, zinnias and wildflowers, and roses all vie for our attention in the garden beds, reminding us of summer awakenings and the promise of new opportunities.

The trees stand sentinel with fresh shoots, watching over our beautiful City. Even with the harsh winter this year, plants are rebounding and showing off by being so resilient. I feel incredibly proud to serve a City that takes such pride in its beauty; by doing so, it not only delights the spirits but also protects and increases property values.

Amidst all the beauty, however, it is concerning when I note the amount of roadside litter our employees are required to pick up on a weekly basis. The Public Works Department conservatively estimates that costs in keeping Ridgeland's streets clean reach upwards of \$45,000 per year. This is an expense that could and should be avoided, and the funds could be put to use in so many more productive ways: the City of Ridgeland Police Department could purchase a patrol car; the Public Works Department could hire needed additional employees; or the Recreation and Parks Department could offer students part-time jobs in the summer that would further help keep our parks the best they can be and keep our recreation and parks programs running smoothly.

I could go on about how this money could be used, but I want instead for each of you to ask yourself what the funds might be used for and to ask each of you, as citizens, to do everything you can to help keep our City clean. First – and I know most of our citizens are highly responsible – you can do this by not littering. Second, you can let our police department know if you see someone littering by taking down their license plate number and sending it to the police department so they can write these individuals a letter encouraging them not to litter. Third, join us on one of our park volunteer clean-up days: they are fun, sociable, and make a positive difference to the community. If we work together, I am convinced that we can keep Ridgeland litter free and continue to promote the beautification of the city, and protect property values.

On the topic of beautification, congratulations to Keep Ridgeland Beautiful for receiving three awards at the 30th Annual Keep Mississippi Beautiful Awards Luncheon. The awards include First Place in the Wild Flowers Trails of Mississippi category, Second Place in the Civic Partnership category for the City's partnership with First Ridgeland Baptist Church, and a Circle of Excellence award from Keep Mississippi Beautiful. Keep Ridgeland Beautiful is also a proud member of the Keep America Beautiful President's Circle.

This spring, it has been particularly exciting to see all the great activities taking place in Ridgeland's schools. Not only are students excelling in academics and sports, but our schools continue to raise the bar. It is fantastic to have such outstanding schools in the City of Ridgeland, led by tremendously talented faculty and administrative leadership.

I hope each of you has a wonderful summer. I know many of you will be traveling, taking vacations to the beach, mountains, and other countries. Please be safe and enjoy this season with family and friends.

After at least three prior locations (Old Town, School Street, and Hwy 51 at Lake Harbour), City Hall moved into the present location in (20) _____.

The Historical Society has been working on an exciting project to enhance our trails and sidewalks while educating walkers, residents, and visitors about the City of Ridgeland. We will have more information on this project soon. Meanwhile, we continue to gather photos and artifacts for permanent exhibit in the History Room at City Hall.

In the March 21, 2023, meeting of the Mayor and Board of Aldermen, it was announced that the northernmost stretch of Wheatley Street will now be called Carr Farms Road. The Historical Society and Historical Committee made this name change recommendation when it was learned that this area was being developed and work had begun on several new homes. The Carr family has lived in Ridgeland for six generations. They owned and farmed this property for many years. This is the second street name change we have proposed, and we hope to honor the history of Ridgeland in this manner in the future.

idgeland offers locals and visitors alike a cycling experience like none other. Enjoy mountain biking, a National Scenic Byway and Park, and biking events for families and competitors. Serious cyclists and casual cruisers share the Natchez Trace Parkway and the Multi-Use Trails in Ridgeland. Some trails even lead to cafes and specialty shops! Ridgeland's BMX and mountain biking will thrill adrenaline seekers. Somehow, all that highperformance fun is even better, knowing that Southern hospitality and fine food await at the end of the day.





Ridgeland boasts annual cycling events for all ages and abilities. A few popular events include the Natchez Trace Century Ride with 25, 50, 62, or 100mile distance options held during Ridgeland's Art, Wine & Wheels Weekend in May. On May 4, 2024, we are excited to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the Natchez Trace Century Ride, which now brings in over 1,000 participants. In September, Jackson Metro Cyclists will hold a Labor Day Ride in Old Trace Park. October brings the two-day Fat Tire Festival and Cycle Out Kid's Cancer. The Ridgeland Cyclocross Series offers events in September, October, and November and hosts the Mississippi Cyclocross Kid's Project. No wonder Ridgeland is the Cycling Capitol of Mississippi!

The City was honored to receive the Bronze Bicycle Friendly Community Award from the League of American Bicyclists. "Being a Bicycle Friendly Community takes more than hosting a yearly event or building a few bike lanes," said Bill Nesper, executive director of the League of American Bicyclists. "The best communities for people who bike are places where efforts to build connected bike networks are complemented by ensuring equal access to bike education and hosting inclusive community rides and events for all types of riders. They are places where embedding equity and accessibility into bicycling efforts is the rule, not the exception, making them truly better for everyone."


THE CHISHA FOKA MULTI-USE TRAIL

id you know that the Mississippi NICA League, a new state-wide youth development organization, has its birth and headquarters in Ridgeland?

The Mississippi NICA League is a 501(c)(3) and is the 31st league in the National Interscholastic Cycling Association. It is our goal to get more Ridgeland and Mississippi kids on bikes! NICA is guided by the values of fun, inclusivity, equity, respect, and community. We build strong bodies, minds, character, and community through cycling.

The first NICA team in Mississippi, the Mississippi Blues Composite Mountain Bike Team, was started by Selena Swartzfager and her son Greyson in 2016 to spend more time together

outdoors. This team had ten student-athletes and three coaches who practiced primarily at the Ridgeland Mountain Bike Trails in Madison County. The young team



participated with the Alabama NICA League, driving 4-6 hours for their races each spring.

Michelle Williams, the newly hired Mississippi NICA League Director, and her grandson Aidan started riding the Ridgeland multiuse trails when he was just four years old. As he got older and more experienced, he wanted to start riding on the road. Michelle was too nervous to let him ride on the more trafficked streets, and when they learned of the Mississippi Blues, they were both ready to start mountain biking. Immediately after riding his first ride with the team, Aidan was so excited. His skills improved exponentially, riding with other kids his age.

Fast forward to today, the Mississippi Blues Composite Mountain Bike Team has grown to thirty students, most from Madison County, with eight athletes living in Ridgeland. The Blues have helped start teams in Oxford and Meridian. The team enjoyed competing in Alabama over the years, but the parents, coaches, and supporters all believed it was time to bring the fun to Mississippi. Selena and Michelle started the Mississippi Interscholastic Cycling League on January 17, 2023.

In the Mississippi NICA League, every youth in the 6th - 12th grade is empowered to be part of a thriving and engaged cycling community. This is not an amateur sports league, as the programs are more focused on developing the whole student-athlete and their families. This League is more than just racing, as the adventure rides and bike games promote a time to "just play" outdoors with friends. This program is proud that there are no tryouts; everyone makes the team. There are no benchwarmers and everyone participates at their level. Stewardship is emphasized by teaching the students respect for the trails they ride through trail maintenance. Additionally, students and their parents are encouraged to become bike advocates by meeting with local community leaders to discuss bike advocacy and the need for additional safe spaces for kids to ride their bikes.

Students and families have all loved participating in a community mountain bike program. Many times a student will join a team and will be the only one in her family who rides a bike. Before the season is over, Mom, Dad, and siblings are all having fun enjoying the benefits of riding a bike in the woods.

The Mississippi NICA Board is excited to bring a great national organization to Mississippi to get more kids on bikes, playing, and having fun outside. Grant Funding Enhances Fight and Color


n 2018, the City of Ridgeland received a grant from the "CN Ecoconnexions from the Ground Up" program in partnership with America in Bloom to plant approximately 300 trees within the median of Highland Colony Parkway. The City of Ridgeland matched the funds provided by this grant from the city's Tree Ordinance "In-lieu Fund."

The project aimed to help promote and foster a healthy community while visually enhancing the parkway. The native shade trees along the parkway include Willow Oaks, Shumard Red Oaks, and Nutall Oaks. Crape Myrtles were also included in the narrow portions of the median to provide spring color and interest. The trees help to lower the surface temperatures within the area by providing shade to the parkway pavement. The trees at maturity will also have the ability to absorb as much as 7 tons of CO2 annually, helping offset the vehicular traffic's environmental impact along the parkway. The tree species selected are long-living trees and will receive continued maintenance from the city. This project supports the tree and canopy coverage goals (40%) of the City of Ridgeland Tree Ordinance.

The project, since its completion in 2019, has drastically changed the aesthetics and views along the parkway. While the canopy of the trees is now reaching the tops of adjacent light poles, the shade, and visual impact will only continue to improve the experience of Highland Colony Parkway for years to come.

Adopted in 2006, The City of Ridgeland Tree Ordinance aims to protect and enhance the existing tree canopy within the City by requiring developers to mitigate the removal of tree canopy within the limits of a proposed development. When developments are unable to plant the total required trees on-site, they have the option to pay into the "In-lieu Fund." This option goes toward funding city-initiated tree planting projects such as this along Highland Colony Parkway.







Nhat You Need to bout French Drains

French drain is a trench filled with gravel or rock, with or without a perforated pipe, used to redirect surface water and groundwater. This practice is a common means of diverting water from one location (ex. near a foundation or a wet area on a property) to another location (ex. municipal (City) storm drain or a nearby swale). A French drain diverts excess rainwater in order to dry soil that is excessively waterlogged.


WHAT IS A FRENCH DRAIN?

An exterior French drain is a trench 6 inches to a few feet in diameter dug along a declined slope on a property. It is covered over with gravel to prevent excess mud and debris from entering the trench and to prevent soil erosion on the inside. Perforated piping may be laid underneath the gravel to accelerate the movement of water through the trench. Gutter downspouts from a home's roof may empty directly into a French drain system to alleviate flooding due to excess rainfall.

ADVANTAGES OF FRENCH DRAINS

- French drains provide an effective way to channel water away from a home to prevent water damage.
- Waterlogged lawns can be transformed and rendered useful for gardens or children's play areas.
- French drains are relatively inexpensive to install, particularly if they do not require excavation of exterior structures, such as walkways and decks.
- Installing a French drain does not necessarily require special tools or heavy equipment.





DISADVANTAGES OF FRENCH DRAINS

- Installing a French drain can be dangerous if there are utilities buried in the vicinity. Always call 811 before you dig!
- Digging may disturb natural water flows and can lead to the pooling of water. It is important to understand the water flow on your site.
- Installing a French drain may require the removal of existing structures, such as decks and walkways, especially if using a backhoe to dig the trench.
- Clogged French drains may overflow without warning and cause damage to yards and basements.
- Exterior French drains installed without a sump pump rely on gravity to direct water flow. An adequate slope for gravity drainage may be difficult to establish for properties located at the bottom of a steep slope.

When deciding whether a French drain is the right solution for your water issues, it is important to consider where the water will ultimately end up. The system should drain into a waste area, a street, a municipal drain, or a suitable area of the landscape (such as near a tree or a rain garden). It should NOT drain into your neighbor's yard. If there is no suitable place to drain the water, consider a different option.







Miss Smith served as a third-grade and lead teacher at the former Ridgeland Elementary School and was shortly after promoted to school principal. It was there that she found her calling. She dedicated her life to serving the staff, students, and school community.

Mrs. Fortenberry, a former ASE Computer teacher, was the last staff member to be hired by Ms. Smith. She describes her as "Small in stature, very tall in all things ASE." Fortenberry said one of the things that stood out the most about Ms. Smith was her dedication to the school. She knew all 800 students by name. She was the first to arrive at the school and the last to leave at the end of the day. She added that ASE continued to excel as an A-rated school under her leadership.

Literacy Specialist Miriam Carman stated that she feels honored to work at the school where Ms. Smith poured out her heart for many years. She always remembered a student who went through her school. Mrs. Carman added that she loves to see the looks on her student's faces when she tells them she was a student at ASE under the actual Ann Smith!

Katie Holden, Technology Specialist, said that what stands out to her is that Ms. Smith still remembered her and her family 20 years later. "She was one of the kindest people I have ever met," stated Holden. Ann Smith will always be remembered as a dedicated, passionate educator and leader who ensured no student was left behind. Upon her retirement in 1991, the Madison County School Board voted to change the school's name to Ann E. Smith Elementary in her honor.

t Highland Elementary School this year, students learned about artist Nick Cave's most famous art form, his Sound Suits. As a young Black man in the 1990s, Cave was strongly affected by the beatings of young Black men and felt his life was endangered. To bring attention to his creativity instead of the color of his skin, Cave created Sound Suits to camouflage his identity - his race, gender, and ethnicity.

Every student at Highland created their own Sound Suit design based on Cave's examples and their creativity. Each class then voted on their favorite designs. From almost 700 drawings, students democratically chose 7 Sound Suit designs to create life-size Sound Suits collaboratively.

Once the students chose the Sound Suit designs, every class put their math and analytical skills to work collaboratively - designing, measuring, and fabricating each part of the 7 Sound Suits. As each Sound Suit reached completion, students were excited to see them come to life and took turns trying on the Sound Suits.

Nick Cave's Sound Suits are often meant to be performative. Students watched films of Cave's Sound Suits in motion and were very fortunate to have choreographer Tobias Griffin from New Orleans give students two weeks of collaborative dance lessons.

Needless to say, the dance sessions were a big success. Some students, who were apprehensive initially, seemed liberated by the process. Mr. Griffin choreographed distinct dances for each grade level.

The Highland Elementary School Sound Suit Project will culminate in a film. Each class will perform and be filmed independently. The final product will be a montage of all the performances.



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
