### **TELLING RIDGELAND'S STORY:**

STILL LEARNING...STILL SHARING...

Several years ago, I asked a friend to research my family history. When I told him what I hoped he would find, he quickly told me that genealogy doesn't work like that. He said, "You have to accept what I find." Of course, the results were not what I had hoped for, and I was left with many unanswered questions. So it goes with historical research.





The Historical Society of Ridgeland has learned several lessons in its fifteen-plus years of discovery.

#### History is sometimes hard to accept:

I read through a Bill of Sale for property James Burroughs Yellowley sold in the early 1850s. According to an interview with Eloise Gilbert, one of the Charter Members of the Historical Society of Ridgeland, "her great grandmother was listed in the 1848 slave purchase of Patience to James Yellowley." Patience later married into the Harris family. When reading about the family's history, I had to put the papers aside and wipe away the tears.

I remember the pride and dignity Eloise exemplified as she told us the story of her ancestors during one of our Society meetings. We are fortunate to have many of their descendants still living in Ridgeland today. A private street, Mary Harris Lane, runs off Ridgeland Avenue, where many of her family still reside.

#### There are always two sides to every story:

In the mid-1900s, clubs allowing gambling and liquor were established in Ridgeland. A few prominent men, unofficially known as The Vigilantes, took action to close these clubs. The "outside operators" were confronted with loud words, clubs, and possibly more. One of these confrontations took place in front of Henderson's Garage.

Eventually, the heavily insured clubs mysteriously burned down, and the owners took their generous insurance proceeds elsewhere. Ridgeland was free of the unwanted businesses, but this left the predominantly African-American workers without employment when well-paying jobs were hard to find.

#### With every answer you find, there are usually two or three more questions:

While curating exhibits for the History Room at City Hall, we researched the mayors of Ridgeland. Several revelations were uncovered in this research. Society member, Robby Carr, said he had always been told that his ancestor, John Wesley Carr, had served as mayor. Matt Dodd, City liaison to the Society, found that Carr did serve from 1917 to 1918. He had to resign when the Carr family built their home on their farm, which was located outside the limits of the Village. Matt also found information on N. L. Ensor, who served

Alfred & Hasty Harris William from 1916 to 1917. After his term ended, Ensor continued to live on Jackson Street. He was in poor health and believed he was being given bad medicine by the local pharmacist, Joseph H. Myers, who also served as postmaster and Alderman.

Missouri Harris Cummings

One morning in May of 1918, Ensor leaned out the window of his home and shot Myers as he was going to his mother's house.

Alfred's Mother, Maude & Patience the Speaks family told the Society a story passed down through the years of a morning when her grandmother had pushed her children under the kitchen table at breakfast because someone was shooting across Jackson Street. We finally found out what all the shooting was about.

through our past as they told the stories of many who are buried there.


The Society was honored to participate in the first Ridgeland Pecan Festival in October. It was a well-attended event, and we saw many old friends and made new ones. A second-grade teacher at Ann Smith Elementary, who just moved here from Illinois, was surprised to learn that many of our early settlers came to Ridgeland from Illinois by train. She plans to use our History Trail Map in her classroom!

A touching display was set up at City Hall in November to honor veterans from Ridgeland. The tribute can be viewed in the History Room.

We look forward to seeing you at the Ridgeland Christmas Tree Lighting on December 4th and the Ridgeland Christmas Parade on December 5th. This year's theme is "Winter Wonderland."

Please go to City Hall, Explore Ridgeland, or the Ridgeland Library and pick up a History Trail Map. There are six Trail Markers in Old Town. Plan to arrive early for either of these events. He threatened others who tried to render aid to the wounded man. However, Myers' mother ignored the threats and went to her son's side. W.R. Saber was shot at while trying to go to Mrs. Myers' aid. When the Madison County Sheriff arrived, citizens had gathered with revolvers and shotguns. Ensor had retreated to his house, where he took his own life. Myers also died from

# COMMUNITY TURNS OUT FOR INAUGURAL RIDGELAND PECAN FESTIVAL

The City of Ridgeland hosted its inaugural Pecan Festival at Freedom Ridge Park on Saturday, October 18, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. Close to 2,000 residents and visitors came together to enjoy a day filled with craftsmen booths, live artist demonstrations, food trucks, a farmers market, a pecan dessert showcase, live music, children's activities, and information booths—offering something for everyone to enjoy. Organizers say this marks the beginning of a new Ridgeland tradition.

"Coming off of the momentum of the 125th Anniversary year in 2024—when the pecan was officially named Ridgeland's City tree and a historical marker honoring its agricultural roots was placed at Freedom Ridge Park—I wanted to design a festival that honored Ridgeland's history while providing old-fashioned family fun in the park for the community," said Festival Chair Kim Cooper. "Thank you to the Pecan Festival Planning Committee, the Recreation and Parks team, Mayor and Board of Aldermen, the Historical Society of Ridgeland, for helping to 'Tell Ridgeland's Story,' our many vendors, musical lineup, and so many others who helped to make it a day to remember."

#### RIDGELAND HONORS ITS VETERANS

# AND PRESERVES THEIR STORIES FOR FUTURE GENERATIONS

The City of Ridgeland observed Veterans Day with its annual ceremony at the Veterans Memory Park at City Hall, paying tribute to those who have served and sacrificed for our nation.

This year's observance carried an added layer of meaning. Following the ceremony, guests were invited to visit a new Veterans Exhibit, curated by Nancy Batson, Chair of the City History Committee.

The exhibit was created especially for this year's program and is now a permanent installation in the Ridgeland History Room at City Hall. It features stories and memorabilia from local veterans, many of whom belong to some of Ridgeland's earliest families.

Among those represented are members of the Board of Aldermen, descendants of the City's founding families, and relatives of the Mayor, City staff, and City committees — a reminder that military service runs deep through Ridgeland's history.

#### **Preserving a Proud Legacy**

The new Veterans Exhibit is a permanent reminder of Ridgeland's history of service and the individuals who shaped it. Each display offers a deeply personal story — one that links the City's past to its present and keeps alive the spirit of dedication that defines its people.

During regular City Hall hours, the exhibit is open to the public, inviting all residents to learn from and honor the veterans who helped define Ridgeland's legacy.







It has been my honor and privilege as curator of the History Room to develop this exhibit featuring the service of 13 veterans. My inspiration to archive the service of these veterans comes from my daddy, David Fox and two of my neighbors, Gordon McLemore, and Hartwell Bowling.

Their stories as well as all of the stories from the veterans featured range from the view of a rear gunner of a B-17 Bomber in the WWII battle fields of Iwo Jema, Philippines, Normandy and the Liberation of Dachau Concentration Camp in Germany, to The Chosin Reservoir in Korea, the airfield at Anson, Vietnam, flying General Marshall and driving General Patton, serving as surgical nurse in Germany and staff Sergeant stateside and present day Syria, have been shared over the years and I wanted to preserve them for future generations. I also want to remind everyone that freedom is not free.

#### **Stories of Service and Sacrifice**

#### Captain Robert Hartwell Bowling, U.S. Army Air Corps

Captain Bowling recorded his experiences in his book *Out From Freeny*, which recounts his transition to B-17 Flying Fortress operations and his service with the 3rd Photo Recon Group under Elliott Roosevelt, son of President Franklin D. Roosevelt. His memoir includes chapters such as "Over the North Atlantic in a Flying Fortress," "Flying General Marshall," and "A Long Dream Fulfilled."

#### Technical Sergeant Harold C. Butler, U.S. Army Air Corps (1942 - WWII)

Trained in Morse Code, Sgt. Butler served as a rear gunner aboard B-17 bombers during World War II. He is the father of Pat Truesdale.

#### Corporal Edward R. Carr, U.S. Marine Corps Reserve

Corporal Carr earned the Bronze Star for heroic actions on Iwo Jima in February 1945 and was wounded in battle, receiving the Purple Heart. His brother, Roger Carr, also served during World War II. Both are great-uncles of Robby Carr.

#### Chief David L. Fox, U.S. Navy Reserve, Seabees Construction Battalion

While stationed in the Philippines during World War II, Chief Fox designed and built a small aircraft-towing vehicle nicknamed the "Doodlebug." He is the father of Nancy Batson, who organized the exhibit.

#### Master Sergeant Austin T. Harbour, U.S. Air Force

A 2010 graduate of Ridgeland High School, MSgt. Harbour served in Operation Freedom Sentinel (2019 - 2020), earning a Commendation Medal for his work supporting the mission that led to the removal of ISIS's top leadership in Syria. He now serves as a Logistics Advisor for the 172nd Contingency Response Team—one of only four units nationwide capable of deploying within 36 hours to establish airfields in remote areas

#### Staff Sergeant Joseph Quincy McGee, U.S. Army (WWII)

McGee served as a tank driver in the European Theater and a part-time jeep driver for General George Patton. He fought in campaigns across Germany and Sicily, was wounded in combat, and received numerous decorations, including the Purple Heart and the European-African-Middle Eastern Campaign Medal with two stars. He is the uncle of Mayor Gene McGee.

#### Sergeant Hansel Gordon McLemore, U.S. Marine Corps (Korea, 1950 - 1951)

A member of the First Marine Division, Sgt. Mc-Lemore fought in five campaigns, including the bitter battle at the Chosin Reservoir in North Korea. As one of the "Chosin Few," he received the Bronze Star with Combat V and a Purple Heart with Cluster. His division twice received the Presidential Unit Citation for extraordinary heroism.

#### Staff Sergeant Vicki Costigan (Holweger), U.S. Air Force

Enlisting near the close of the Vietnam era, she served six years at Grissom Air Force Base in Indiana and completed her service in 1980 as a Staff Sergeant.

#### Colonel Douglas I. "D.I." Smith, Jr., U.S. Army (Retired)

During his 27-year career, Col. Smith served in Vietnam as Section Leader of the 129th Aviation Company (Assault Helicopter). His many honors include the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star, Meritorious Service Medal, ten Air Medals, and the Ranger Tab.

#### Lieutenant Colonel Audrey R. Rials, U.S. Air Force

Lt. Col. Rials joined the Air Force in 1950 after completing her nursing degree in Memphis. She served as a surgical nurse at postings in Germany, Japan, and the United States, including Keesler Air Force Base in Biloxi, where she became Chief Surgical Nurse. She is the aunt of Jim Woodrick.

#### Edward W. Young, U.S. Army (WWII)

Serving with the Seventh Army during the liberation of the Dachau Concentration Camp, Young discovered a German manuscript of propaganda writings from 1920 - 1933. He later had it translated and published by the Young Book Company under the title *Germany Awakes*.

#### Private First-Class James William (J.W.) Benefield, U.S. Army (WWII)

Served during World War II and is the maternal grandfather of Angela Richburg. He was in the Army 207th Engineer C Battalion and journeyed from the Beach of Normandy, France, on June 15, 1944, to Berlin, Germany, on June 27, 1945.

#### Master Sergeant Robert L. Gilbert, U.S. Air Force

A member of one of Ridgeland's First Families, MSgt. Gilbert was proud of his service and often visited local classrooms in full dress uniform to share his experiences with students.

# KEEP RIDGELAND BEAUTIFUL: CELEBRATING TIM TAYLOR

28 YEARS OF DEDICATION TO THE CITY OF RIDGELAND

After 28 years of dedicated service, Tim Taylor is retiring from the City of Ridgeland Recreation and Parks department. Tim's contributions can be found throughout many of Ridgeland's parks and green spaces.









Never Forget Garden: A national call was made from the Society of the Honor Guard, Tomb of the Unknown Soldier to pay respects to all Veterans and their families on the centennial year of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier by planting a Never Forget Garden. Taylor identified the space and designed the garden area in Freedom Ridge Park, incorporating existing plantings as well. The Never Forget Garden opened with a ribbon cutting on Nov 12, 2021. Planted in the garden is the eponymous Never Forget Rose.

**Bulb Program:** Tim selected places through the City to plant thousands of daffodil bulbs. Bulbs were donated to KRB from Keep Mississippi Beautiful.

**Collaboration with KRB:** Tim's vision for the Wildflower Field and Art Park brought murals, metal sculptures, gigantic butterflies, and the one-of-a-kind Wildflower Pavillion/photo stop to our City.

**Pat Fordice Award:** For his extraordinary achievements moving the mission forward, Keep Mississippi Beautiful honored Tim with the award named for Mississippi's former First Lady.



Tim was there from the start when the Keep Ridgeland Beautiful (KRB) Committee was formed ten years ago. His first major project with the group—the Keep Mississippi Beautiful's Great American Cleanup Kickoff at Midway Park—set the tone for what was to come.

Partnering with former Director of Public Works Mike McCollum, with sponsors and the community volunteers, Tim helped design and transform Midway Park into an award-winning space that became the foundation for KRB's future success.

Among the many jewels in Ridgeland's crown is the Wildflower Field and Art Park, a showcase of art and nature that has earned two national and several state awards, including the Tourism Partnership of the Year with Explore Ridgeland. Tim

has also been awarded the Keep Mississippi Beautiful's Pat Fordice Award.

In early spring, as daffodils bloom along the City's multipurpose trails, residents enjoy another of Tim's projects, which includes naturalized bulbs planted with help from KRB.

Tim has also guided countless volunteers who work with KRB, helping direct efforts that contribute thousands of dollars' worth of time to maintaining and enhancing the City's parks.

Tim designed and led the installation of Mississippi's first Never Forget Garden at Freedom Ridge Park, a collaborative project between the Mississippi State Society Daughters of the American Revolution (MSSDAR) and Keep Ridgeland Beautiful, honoring the centennial of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. Ginger Cocke, a member

of KRB and MSSDAR, spearheaded the project and with the founder of the Never Forget Garden program, Richard A. Azzaro, presented at the national Keep America Beautiful conference, where Ridgeland's project was also awarded a Keep America Beautiful Innovation Award.

Tim's generosity of time and talent extends outside of work, as he guides alligator hunts, is a taxidermist, and has been featured on *Mississippi Outdoors*. An avid outdoorsman, he also captures Mississippi moments with beautiful photos.

From artists to anglers, Tim's telephone seems to have a contact for any project need. We have benefited from his landscape design skills, willingness to always go the extra mile, and drive to improve things.

#### Holmes Launches Hotel and Restaurant Management Technology Program



Holmes Community College recently announced the launch of a new Hotel and Restaurant Management Technology program on the Ridgeland Campus. The program, which expands upon the college's long-standing Culinary Arts Technology program, provides students with an option to pursue careers in the growing hospitality and tourism industry.

The Culinary Arts Technology program focuses on hands-on lab instruction led by a chef instructor in a commercial kitchen. Students gain practical experience in food preparation while also preparing to earn their ServSafe Manager certification from the National Restaurant Association upon completion of CUT 1213 Sanitation and Safety.

The new Hotel and Restaurant Management Technology program provides specialized career and technical instruction in all hotel and restaurant management phases. The curriculum is designed to prepare students for leadership roles in the hospitality and tourism industry, including positions as general managers and directors of operations. Instruction covers travel and tourism, hotel and lodging facilities, food services, recreation facilities, hospitality marketing, franchise and unit management, business and financial management, hospitality transportation and logistics, and industry policies and regulations.

Instructor Alexei Harrison, who leads the program at Holmes, said the expansion directly responds to student and industry needs. "We have listened to our students and

industry over the past five years. The need for flexible degree options and training to fit the varied career goals of our students pushed us to expand the course offerings of the traditional culinary or hospitality degree. Our students can now customize the learning experience by choosing from the many baking and pastry, advanced culinary, or hospitality course electives being offered," stated Harrison.

Harrison added, "Our Hotel and Restaurant Management degree prepares students for leadership in one of the world's most dynamic industries. With hands-on experience, industry connections, and a focus on hospitality, graduates are prepared to build careers in hotels, resorts, restaurants, and beyond. The opportunities are endless, both internationally and at home. Once students complete the required coursework, they can earn the nationally

recognized Restaurant Management Professional credential from the National Restaurant Association."


In addition, instructor Lori Morrison teaches both Culinary Arts and advanced Baking and Pastry courses at Holmes. While the Baking and Pastry degree is not yet an official program, Holmes already offers all the required courses, giving students another avenue to enhance their skills.

"We are so very proud of how Chef Alexei Harrison has built this program over the past few years," said Vice President for Career cent of employment in the state. By 2029, that number is projected to grow by 10.2 percent, adding 12,400 jobs for a total of 134,300.

Employment opportunities in hospitality are expected to continue increasing nationwide. The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics projects employment of chefs and head cooks to grow 11 percent from 2018 to 2028, faster than the average for all occupations, with most opportunities in food services such as restaurants. Food service managers should see the same increase of 11 percent. In 2024, the BLS estimated that the median

salary for food service managers averaged \$65310, while lodging managers averaged \$68,130. The BLS also notes that an associate degree is the minimum requirement for various entry-level positions in the hospitality field.

# RIDGELAND FIRE DEPARTMENT CREATES NEW PATHWAYS FOR VETERANS THROUGH APPRENTICESHIP PROGRAM

The Ridgeland Fire Department (RFD), led by a veteran who knows firsthand the meaning of service, is opening new doors for those who have served in the armed forces. Guided by a deep understanding of what it means to give back, RFD is helping veterans transition from military life to public service—continuing their mission to protect and serve in a new capacity.

The program provides a structured, hands-on learning experience that blends classroom instruction, fieldwork, and real-world practice. It gives veterans a strong foundation in emergency response while easing the transition into civilian life through mentorship and teamwork—hallmarks of both military and fire service culture.

RFD is also developing plans to expand the program to include onboarding for veterans who wish to become Firefighters or EMT-Basics. This next step will open additional opportunities for service-minded individuals to join the department, further strengthening Ridgeland's ability to respond to emergencies with professionalism and compassion.

Through this initiative, the City of Ridgeland reaffirms its dedication to supporting veterans while investing in the community's safety and resilience. The program is a powerful example of how service can evolve, allowing those who once defended our nation to continue protecting it at home.

With the support of the Board of Aldermen and in partnership with the School of EMS and COMPASS, the City of Ridgeland has introduced an Apprenticeship Program for Emergency Medical Technician—Basic (EMT-B) training. This effort allows veterans to use their GI Bill benefits to complete the School of EMS's Paramedic program, setting them on a path toward a fulfilling and lasting career in emergency medical services.

# HOW YOU CAN PREVENT STORMWATER POLLUTION

Polluted stormwater is the #1 source of water pollution in the country, but you can do your part to help keep the waterways of Ridgeland and the Reservoir clean and flowing.



#### What is Stormwater?

Stormwater is water from rain that does not soak into the ground. It flows from rooftops, over paved areas, bare soil, and sloped lawns. Stormwater collects and transports animal waste, litter, soil, pesticides, fertilizers, oil & grease, and other potential pollutants as it flows.

#### What's the Problem?

Rain events wash pollutants from land, streets, and construction sites into storm sewers and drainage ditches. Eventually,

this empties the polluted stormwater directly into our streams, rivers, and, ultimately, the Ross Barnett Reservoir without treatment.

Polluted stormwater degrades our lakes, rivers, wetlands, reservoirs, and other waterways. Nutrients such as phosphorus and nitrogen can cause algae's overgrowth, resulting in oxygen depletion. Toxic substances from motor vehicles and careless application of pesticides and fertilizers threaten water quality and can kill fish and other aquatic life. Bacteria from animal wastes and improper connections

to storm sewer systems can make lakes and waterways unsafe for wading, swimming, and fish consumption.

Eroded soil is a pollutant as well. It can cloud waterways and interfere with fish and plant life habitats.

Many types of pollutants find their way into storm drains.

#### **Common pollutants** found in storm sewers and drainageways include:

- Animal Waste
- Litter
- Motor oil
- Yard clippings
- Fertilizers and pesticides
- Soapy car wash water
- Eroded sediment from construction sites

It's important to remember that any surface water runoff, not just rainfall, can run into the storm sewer and collect in the stormwater management system. For example, when you wash your car on the driveway, the water, dirt, and grime can end up in the system. That's why we must be careful with what we put into the storm sewers, as traces of all this material can end up in the stormwater system and our local waterways.

#### What can you do to Prevent Stormwater Pollution in Ridgeland?

- Remember: Only rain belongs in the drain!
- Wash your car over your lawn or gravel.
- Keep your car well-maintained.
- Consider disconnecting your downspouts and rerouting the water into a rain garden.
- Use lawn or garden chemicals sparingly.
- Plant native, low-maintenance plants and grasses.
- Minimize runoff by not over-watering your lawn and garden.
- Clean up pet waste.
- Consider minimizing impervious surfaces around your home.
- Do not drain your pool, spa, or fountain to a storm drain.
- Make sure storm drain outfalls are not running in dry weather. If it hasn't rained in 72 hours, it should not be flowing. Call Ridgeland Public Works at 601-853-2027 if you see a potential problem.
- Properly maintain your neighborhood stormwater pond.
- Install a rain barrel or cistern to capture roof runoff.
- Walk, bike, or share a ride when possible.


