


From the Mayor

By the time you receive this magazine, the new recycling program will be in full swing. While much information has been provided about this new program, I felt it would be a good idea to go over some of the main points of the program and remind each of us how important this program is.

As you know, Ridgeland has had mandatory recycling for some time, and our percentage of participants has been very good compared to other cities. However, with the need to reduce the amount of waste going to the landfill and to set an example for other cities, we felt it was important to go to an even more exciting and improved recycling plan. The new recycling containers have much more capacity and allow one to participate in the recycling program in a much easier manner. Also, the fact that each household will be able to build up points through the recycle bank and get discounts on many, many purchases will, we hope, give an incentive to increase participation in the recycling program.

There have also been some questions about the fact that the recycling company is not taking glass. Unfortunately, not being able to recycle glass has been an issue for a number of years, even before we started this new program, and we will continue to look to the recycling company to attempt to find markets so that glass can be recycled and not sent to the landfill. Our goal in the City of Ridgeland is to attempt to have as many products as possible to be recycled and to put a very small percentage of garbage into the landfill.

We have enjoyed very low tipping fees at the landfills in our area for a long time, but as the landfills fill up and the places to actually put garbage become more scarce, we will find that the cost of doing away with solid waste in landfills is going to get higher and higher. One can look to the northeastern United States and see the high prices that are being paid to carry garbage to the landfill, and this trend will come south to us as years go on. We enjoy relatively low rates to do away with our garbage at this time, and by working hard to recycle as many products as possible, we can plan for the future and not have to pay the outrageous rates that many cities across the country are paying. Plus, it is environmentally sound to reduce waste going to a landfill.

I hope that each of you will work hard to boost the amount of recycling that you do at your home. Recycling is good for the environment and will help us continue to grow as a green city.

As we reach this holiday season, my wishes for each of you is that you have a very blessed time and that the New Year brings you much prosperity and good health.



West Jackson Street will be closed from Sunnybrook Road to Maple Street during the parade.

Ridgeland Mobile Mapping App

The City of Ridgeland's Community Development Department's Planning and GIS Division has just released a mobile GIS mapping application. The mapping program is intended to be used by interested residents as well as city employees. The application can be installed on most smart phones or tablets (iPhone or Android) and can be linked to access the city's GIS database.

The phone/tablet application is provided by ESRI and can be downloaded through the iTunes store or Google Play. The app has the ability to not only view city data but edit it as well. A city department/jobspecific map can be set up and used by city employees in the field. With the phone's internal GPS enabled, the user can track his or her location on the map while collecting information and updating the City's data.

This data is used by every department and, with this application, citizens can now view this data. It is expected that this application will improve productivity and efficiency, and the use of the application and project-specific maps will increase as more uses are developed.







Newcomers Guide to Ridgeland Now Available

The City of Ridgeland has recently printed a Newcomers Guide to Ridgeland in a 6" x 11" card format. It is available to the public and distributed through City Hall. All new residents who set up a utility account through the Utility Billing office will receive one. To make it easy for newcomers to learn more about the city and its services, a scan code to the City of Ridgeland website, www.ridgelandms.org, is available on the guide.

The guide includes a city directory with an abbreviated list of services and functions for each department, making it convenient for you, ensuring that your call is made to the correct department. Additional city information is provided such as important Ridgeland laws to become familiar with as a newcomer, location and basic information about the city's recreational facilities and youth organizations, and how to get involved and be "in the know." Community information included on the card: auto tags, voter registration, electricity, natural gas, public schools, tax collector, chamber of commerce, library and visitors center.

The Newcomers Guide to Ridgeland is not just for newcomers! So, come on down to City Hall and pick up a copy to have on hand as a convenient, quick resource.

100% Rental Inspection Program



Did you know that the City of Ridgeland requires 100 percent of the rental properties in Ridgeland to pass inspection every time the unit is vacated by a tenant? The only exception is if the unit has been inspected within

the previous 12 months. The Mayor and Board of Aldermen adopted this provision for rental houses and apartments in April 2010 to improve assurance of public safety, health and welfare.

Ridgeland has a great relationship with Entergy to assist in the enforcement of this ordinance provision. Entergy requires a Release Permit from the Community Development Department in order to connect electricity to a residential structure in Ridgeland. When a customer makes application for electric service, Entergy normally advises every one of their new customers to contact the City of Ridgeland for the permit. The City's inspection manager is tasked with the function of taking the customer's information, verifying that a rental inspection is either required or not, and entering the information into Entergy's online program to clear the unit for electricity.

Considering the intent to ensure public health, safety and welfare, Ridgeland officials take this ordinance provision very seriously. If someone is found in violation of the required inspection process, they can be charged with a misdemeanor and will be subject to a fine of up to \$1,000 and/or 60 days in jail for each day they continue to be in violation. The ordinance also provides the ability for the water service to be disconnected or refused.

In addition to the rental inspection program, the Community Development Department continues to maintain strong support from the Mayor and Board of Aldermen for the Code Enforcement Program, which focuses on rental and owner-occupied property. The City employs two full-time Code Enforcement Officers who manage citizen complaints about possible code violations, as well as canvass the City for violations. Officers have taken a much more aggressive stance this year for habitual violators who have found themselves addressing their issues in Municipal Court. The most common violations this year have been overgrown grass, parking in front yard, accumulation of items and exterior structure violations.

Police Officers of the Month Announced



Officer Ben Johnson was selected as Officer of the Month for July 2012. He was nominated for an arrest in a larceny case. Due to Johnson's efforts, approximately \$1,200 in stolen goods from Kroger on County Line Road was recovered. As stated in the report by Detective Mark Penn, "Through Johnson's attention to detail during a traffic stop on I-55 near I-220, he observed numerous boxes of new items in plain view on the rear seat area of a stopped vehicle. Through Johnson's investigation, he determined that the occupants could not produce a receipt or any valid reason for possessing the items. Johnson was able to make a traffic arrest and continue his investigation which confirmed that the bulk of the items were stolen property."

that had been occurring for

to a report provided by Lt.

John Neal, these burglaries occurred in multiple tenant office buildings where inner doors were kicked in and various office furnishings were stolen. In one burglary, a large amount of currency was also stolen. Throughout the investigation, Ready and Martin were able to locate and collect evidence and coordinate with the Madison PD that had also noted a similar pattern of business burglaries. A suspect vehicle description was developed leading to one of our alert patrolmen spotting the vehicle in a multiple-tenant building parking lot off County Line Road. The suspect was arrested for Possession of Burglary Tools. Over the following weeks, investigators executed numerous search warrants and were able to locate and recover items that were stolen from the businesses as well as seize the vehicle used by the suspect.

Rice Road Trailhead project to be constructed over the winter

A new covered pavilion and restroom facility will be constructed at the trailhead of the Ridgeland multi-use trail near the Rice Road and Harbor Drive intersection. The facility will include an openair pavilion with two restrooms, two picnic tables and one bike rack. Construction will begin in November and be completed in January.

The existing gravel parking lot will be closed during construction, and parking will not be allowed in the trailhead lot. The project is expected to be completed by January 2013. At that time, the lot will reopen and the trailhead facility will be available for use.

City officials are excited about this project and what it will mean to trail users as a community meeting place. The facility will offer an enjoyable place for picnics and fill a need for restrooms on the trail.

Groundbreaking Held for Lake Harbour Drive Widening Project

The City of Ridgeland celebrated the start of construction of the Lake Harbour Drive Widening Project with a groundbreaking ceremony on Tuesday, September 4. Officials, contractors and members of the public attended the history-making event. Construction began immediately by the City's contractor, Eutaw Construction Company, Inc. Engineering and design were completed by Waggoner Engineering, Inc.

Lake Harbour Drive is being widened to five lanes from Northpark Drive to Highway 51. The new roadway will be similar to the portion of Lake Harbour Drive located east of Northpark Drive. In the new design, the following elements are included: center turn lane, landscaping, multiuse trail, new traffic signals and new water lines.

Living Green in Your Home: Recycling

It's a great idea to reduce waste in your home and recycle instead of throwing away waste. It reduces the amount of waste that is dumped and can take years to decompose. By reducing your waste, you have less to keep up with. Through buying non-per-

ishable items in bulk, you cut down on unnecessary packaging, and, therefore, have less to get rid of. Below are some tips to help you with your efforts to recycle and reduce waste in your home.

Recycle

- Find a place that's convenient to collect recyclable items. The kitchen is a good option since most items come from there.
- Take your leftover plastic bags to the local grocery store, such as Kroger or Walmart, because they are collected to use for plastic lumber.
- In Ridgeland, we recycle everything but glass, Styrofoam™ and
- Buy rechargeable batteries to save money in the long run. Recycle worn-out rechargeable batteries like those in power tools, cell phones and computers. Interstate Battery is a place in Ridgeland that recycles batteries and sells rechargeable batteries.
- Recycle junk mail or use it as scratch paper. You can opt out of certain mailing lists by going to www.opt-out.cdt.org.

Reduce waste

- Buying non-perishable items in bulk allows you to cut down on unnecessary packaging.
- If there's a water cooler at work, use a glass instead of a plastic cup.
- Holding a yard sale or donating old items to a second-hand store are great ways to get rid of your old items that will be valuable to someone else.
- When needing paper copies, use both sides of the paper.
- By leaving the clippings after mowing your grass when it's dry, the lawn underneath will be broken down and fed.

In addition to recycling and reducing waste in your home, be sure to participate in the annual Household Hazardous Waste Day to rid your home of dangerous chemicals in a safe way. Various organizations, businesses and individuals have contributed to the project, which was inspired by Ridgeland resident Adam Malone who suffers from Duchenne Muscular Dystrophy.

FAQ about the New Recycling Program

What are we doing? In October, Ridgeland residents received a new recycling cart. This 64-gallon rolling cart allows for all recyclables to be mixed together. The list of acceptable recyclables has not changed. For your convenience, acceptable items are listed on the cart. Some areas of the city now follow a new recycling collection schedule. Incentives to recycle are available to those who register through Recyclebank.

Why are we doing this? The City wanted to provide an incentive program to increase our tons of recycling. Currently, we produce 50 tons on average per month that does not go to the landfill. Our goal is to encourage more recycling and to be good stewards of our environment. The cart makes it easier to recycle more.

What are the new containers? Residents of single-family homes have received a 64-gallon cart with a lid, wheels and instructions on what to recycle. The larger cart allows you to recycle more and to easily roll your recyclables to the curb. You do not need to separate recyclables in the cart; they will be separated at the processing plant. If you have not already done so, you may place the old recycling bin at the curb on your recycling collection day for Waste Management to pick up.

What is the Recyclebank program?

- How do I learn more and register? For general information and to register your account, go to www.Recyclebank.com/wm.
 Each customer should have received a letter containing a unique PIN (personal identification number) informing you of the best way to register online. Please sign up so that you can begin accumulating credits right away.
- How do the points work? All accounts will receive 300 points after registration, then 2.5 points per pound of recyclables. The

- way it works is all of the recyclables for the City are weighed, and points are evenly distributed to all account holders that recycle each month. A radio frequency identification chip is embedded into each recycling cart that records each time the cart is emptied into the recycling truck. This information is sent to Recyclebank for processing each account.
- What are my points worth? The value nationwide is \$164 per year
 per account holder who consistently recycles. This value is in the form
 of discounts at local and nationwide vendors (over 200) including
 McDonald's and Dick's Sporting Goods to name a few. Most are in
 the form of printable or downloadable coupons for direct savings or
 percentage off a purchase. All points are cumulative and are banked
 in your account until they are redeemed.
- How do I redeem rewards? Log on to your account through Recyclebank's website and browse rewards available in our area. Then print or download coupons to save money on items you purchase.
- What if I do not have a computer? You may open your account over the phone at 888-727-2978. Select option "1."

What if I do not want to participate? You

may contact Public Works at 601-853-2027 to request that Waste Management pick up your cart, if you have not already done so. The recycling fee is mandatory, and the monthly fee is charged to all single-family residents. If at any time you change your mind and want to recycle, contact Public Works, and Waste Management will deliver your cart.

Will there be a cost increase? We have determined that there will be a slight cost increase. While you are paying \$3.01 now, it may go up to \$4.10, but we are not certain about the exact change at this time. We should know by January or February what the exact increase will be.

Recreational facilities

Freedom Ridge Park

235 West School Street - Freedom Ridge Park, a 50-acre athletic facility, is located on School Street just behind the Ridgeland Police Department. The park features four lighted adult regulation softball fields, four lighted regulation soccer fields, four picnic pavilions, two playgrounds, two concession/restroom buildings, a lighted walking trail and a maintenance facility.

Each of the four pavilions at Freedom Ridge Park is available at an hourly rate of \$15 for residents, and \$25 for non-residents. The security deposit, our "clean-up insurance," is \$100.

Ridgeland Tennis Center

201 McClellan Drive - The Ridgeland Tennis Center, a full-service public facility operated by tennis pros, is located at 201 McClellan Drive, off Highway 51. The center is home to 17 lighted, hard tennis courts, men's and women's locker rooms, a 2,000-square-foot covered porch for viewing, and a fully stocked tennis pro shop.

City Hall

304 Highway 51 - Ridgeland City Hall is home to four soccer fields during the soccer season. During baseball season, this property converts to three T-ball fields.

Ridgeland **Recreational Center**

137 Old Trace Park - The Ridgeland Recreational Center is housed in a twostory rustic lodge overlooking the Ross Barnett Reservoir. Daily activities for Superstar Seniors as well as nightly classes for all ages take place during the week in this facility.

Friendship Park

475 Lake Harbour Drive - Friendship Park is a multi-purpose neighborhood park facility. With a large lighted pavilion, a one-mile lighted walking/jogging trail, a fitness court, playground equipment, and restroom facilities, the park accommodates many and varying needs.

The pavilion is available for rental at an hourly rate of \$15 for residents, \$25 per hour for non-residents, with a security deposit of \$100. Park hours are 6:30 a.m. to 10 p.m.

Wolcott Park

349 McClellan Drive - Wolcott Park, a 40-acre athletic facility, is located on McClellan Drive, off Highway 51. It features seven lighted baseball/softball fields, a playground, 14 batting cages, two bullpens, two concession/restroom buildings and a maintenance facility.

Titans Tone Up for Titan Trot 5K



Ann Smith and Highland Elementary students are excited to start the Titan Tone Up, a six-week fitness program culminating in the community road race Titan Trot 5K and one-mile fun run on March 2.

When it comes to childhood obesity, Ridgeland elementary schools are doing their part to knock Mississippi down from its number-one ranking. The Parent Teacher Organizations of Ann Smith and Highland Elementary are teaming up to plan the Titan Trot 5K and one-mile fun run. The race will start at Ann Smith on Saturday, March 2.

Of course, it's going to take more than just a 3.1-mile run to battle the obesity epidemic. That's why in mid-January, both Ann Smith and Highland are launching the Titan Tone Up, a six-week program that will encourage students to get the recommended amount of physical activity each week, and help them to develop a lifelong habit of regular exercise. During the program, the children will be asked to keep a log of their physical activity outside of school hours. Examples include walking the dog, going to soccer practice, playing at the park—any activity that will increase their core temperature

and their heart rate. Children who meet the weekly goal will receive a small prize. Those who meet the goal for all six weeks will be eligible for other rewards and recognition.

Data-Driven Developmental Reading Assessments

Several times a year, Ann Smith Elementary (ASE) teachers conduct a one-on-one reading assessment with each student at ASE. This Developmental Reading Assessment (DRA2) provides teachers with a method for assessing and documenting students' development as readers over time. Its purpose is to identify students' independent reading level in terms of accuracy, fluency and comprehension. Once students' reading levels are determined, our teachers use the data collected from the assessment to group students according to their strengths and weaknesses. Our teachers then plan daily small-group guided reading lessons for each student at ASE. Daily small-group guided reading based off the DRA2 results is just one of the many instructional techniques teachers at ASE use to build each student's independent reading skills.

HES to Hold Science Fun Day

In addition, Hill sponsored a six-week club in October and November for young scientists, teaching them many of the same experiments she learned from the academy.

"Brenda Hill is such a great resource for us," said Principal Marilyn Naron. "We will continue to receive

many benefits from her training."



Holmes Students More Likely to Graduate

According to a recent study released by CNNMoney, students who attend Holmes Community College are more likely to graduate or transfer to a four-year school than students who attend other community colleges nationwide.

Holmes ranks 76th out of 786 institutions, placing the school in the top 10 percent of America's community colleges. Holmes was the second-highest-rated Mississippi community college trailing only Pearl River Community College.

College Measures, a joint venture of the American Institute of Research and Matrix Knowledge Group, conducted the study in an attempt to help students and parents avoid "dropout factories," which are labeled as schools that graduate fewer than 25 percent of students. To make sure that schools did not appear on the list of Top Schools because of a statistical blip, small schools with fewer than 200 students were not considered as a part of the study.

The rankings are based on the percentage of students who graduated or transferred to a four-year university within three years of enrolling. Last year alone, graduation numbers at Holmes increased a dramatic

35.41 percent over the previous year, leading Mississippi's community college system in percentage gain. This is the second year in a row that Holmes has seen a significant increase in student graduation numbers, President Glenn Boyce said.

Boyce attributes the school's success to several factors, the first of which is a high-performing student population matched with an incredibly dedicated and talented faculty.

"Many of our students come to us lacking basic college readiness," Boyce explained. "I firmly believe that this type of national recognition is evidence that we make up more ground than most, and we do so without sacrificing quality. In many ways, it is our job to bring out the best in our students. This type of success penetrates to the very heart of our mission."

"Education is the most strategic advantage we have in Mississippi," Boyce said. "If we want to continue to move forward as a state and to change the lives of Mississippians, it is important that we stand firm in our commitment to meet the needs of Mississippi students and continue to build an educated workforce."




